## Number of Nouns

Countable nouns can be counted, when the countable noun is one, we call it singular number. When a countable noun means 'more than one' we call it plural number.

To make plural we generally need suffixes. The common plural suffixes are -----

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-s -es -ies -ves
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## Some rules for making plural from singular------

- Most of the countable nouns have the regular-s plural which is formed by adding an $s$ to the singular. Book-books
- Nouns ending in $-\mathrm{s},-\mathrm{ss},-\mathrm{sh},-\mathrm{ch},-\mathrm{z},-\mathrm{x}$ are changed into plural by adding -es

| Bus-buses | box-boxes |

| Class-classes | brush-brushes |

- If the last letter of a word is-o and the letter before -o is a consonant, the plural is made by adding -es. Tomato-tomatoes hero-heroes
- Some technical and scientific words borrowed from Latin and other foreign languages end with-o and have consonant before them but the plural is made by adding only-s.
Photo-photos zero-zeros
- Words ending in-o and a vowel before -o are changed into plural by adding only-s
Radio-radios cuckoo-cuckoos
- A few common words ending with -o can have plural in -s or-es Buffalo-buffalos/buffaloes mosquito-mosquitos/mosquitoes
- If the singular ends in consonant $+y$ the plural is normally formed by changing the $y$ to $i$ and then adding -es
Baby-babies story-stories
- If the singular noun ends in vowel+y the plural is made by adding s.

Key-keys monkey-monkeys

- Some nouns ending in -f or fe are made plural by adding -ves after the removal of -f or -fe .
Calf-calves knife-knives
- Some nouns ending in -f, -fe, -ff, -oof, -ief, -eef, -off, -erf, are made plural by adding only s.
Safe-safes roof-roofs chief-chiefs
- Some words ending in -f may take both -s and -ves Staff-staffs/staves hoof-hoofs/hooves
- Some plurals are made by adding -en Child-children ox-oxen
- Some words are made plural by the internal change of vowels. Man-men tooth-teeth
- Compound nouns generally form plural by making the plural of the principal word. Some of them may take the ending in the last unimportant part.
Brother - in - law--- brothers -in-law
Maid-servant----maid-servants
- Some nouns are singular in forms but used as plural. People, cattle, public, police
- Some nouns denoting a tool, instrument or article or dress consisting of two equal parts, are always plural.
Scissors, trousers, glasses,
- Some nouns end in-s but these are singular in number.
